

News from the CNCF Nursing Care Review Integration Node

Just as a reminder, the aims of this Node are to:

- Identify nursing care phenomena to investigate within existing Cochrane reviews
- Develop and evaluate a methodology to locate evidence on nursing phenomena (review and synthesis from existing reviews)
- Establish an inventory and priorities for care concept reviews and identify review teams
- Generate a CNCF database of care concept reviews

This year, the work of the Node has been on two fronts:

development of a provisional methodology to conduct the reviews

- across existing Cochrane Review Groups, and
- 2) formulation of a conceptual framework for nursing care concept reviews.

As part of the initial activity to aid this work, one of the Node members, Bridie Kent (based in Australia) has been exploring ways of searching the Cochrane Library in order to best identify nursing care concepts.

Various issues and challenges have influenced this work, including that there is a lack of professional agreement upon chosen terminology in nursing; that the work in this area has given rise to an increase in the number of terminologies; differences between these form significant barriers to the comparison and interchange of health information.

Thus there is growing demand for a new way of working or searching to help identify specific foci in libraries such as the Cochrane Library, since this would possibly enhance quality, give a greater coherence between databases, and reduce effort those who search regularly know how irritating it is to have to identify different terms for each database that you are searching.

So we have reached the point where we can begin to build upon work by Boldt et al (2010), who have identified commonalities and areas where differences are seen between two of the major classification systems (NANDA-I and the International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health (ICF)). Their work focused on terminology for care planning, rather than database searching or identification of a framework for nursing care concept reviews. More testing is needed to determine how





effective this system will be for searching for nursing-related evidence or nursing care concepts within the Cochrane Library. To do this it would be great to find interested people who can help to systematically search the Cochrane Library using new frameworks such as the ICF and other controlled vocabularies (such as OVID Nursing Subject Thesaurus) to explore which, if any, are more effective than others - for different areas of nursing practice.

- treatment or prevention of alcohol addiction
- Otitis Media
- treatment and prevention of Trachoma
- heart failure treatment:

- treatments to lower blood pressure in primary hypertension
- physical and psychological interventions for continence in women
- interventions for obesity
